

MARKET ALERTS

Avocado: Markets are rising as California and Peru wind down. Flora Loca is starting in limited quantities with lower maturity. California's season runs through August; Colombian shipments are decreasing, and Peru's supply continues until late August.

Bell Peppers: Supplies are extremely limited due to high temperatures in the San Joaquin Valley. Eastern regions show slight increases in #1 grade products, but choice options are scarce.

Blackberries: Availability is very limited, but Oregon harvesting is beginning to ease shortages.

Broccoli: Salinas Valley supplies are slightly lower due to heat.

Brussels Sprouts: Light supply outlook with high prices for bulk packs and limited processed availability. Quality is generally good with some elongated seed stems.

Carrots: Cuyama and Santa Maria are the main growing regions, with production through early October, but Jumbo carrots are limited due to heat.

Oranges: Harvest volumes are low, peaking at 72ct and larger; 88/113/138ct sizes will be tight post-summer break.

Garlic: The market is steady, with domestic supplies arriving by late July or early August. Green Onions: Heat and humidity in Northern Mexico are expected to reduce yields and raise prices.

The California fresh pear season has begun in the Sacramento River Delta growing district, with Bartlett and Red Bartlett starting the season. Harvests from Lake County and Mendocino regions are set to begin in early to mid-August. Read more

WEATHER

Arizona - South-central Arizona may experience scattered showers and thunderstorms today, with dry conditions and warmer-than-normal temperatures. Highs range from 104-110, with light to moderate south-south winds decreasing.

<u>California</u> - High pressure system and moderate marine layer conditions will lead to above-average temperatures through the weekend, with morning lows in the mid-40s, daytime highs in the upper 50s to 70s.

Florida -Florida may experience isolated showers on Wednesday and Thursday, with moisture levels limited. Warm temperatures and gusty winds will shift towards the tropics over the weekend.

<u>Mexico</u> - Central Mexico is forecasted to experience isolated showers through August 4th, with rainfall ranging from 0.02 to 0.20 inches, and normal temperatures throughout the weekend.

IN PEAK SEASON

Iceberg Lettuce: Supplies are tightening; larger heads are available from Salinas Valley and Southern California, though some are misshapen.

Tender Leaf Lettuce: Supplies will be tight next week due to harvesting of younger, smaller products.

Pineapple: Limited supply; Costa Rican pineapples face drought, and Mexican varieties have quality issues from heavy

Tomatoes: Slow supply from Tennessee and limited West Coast availability due to bloom drop and reduced acreage.

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Apples

New crop Washington apples are just around the corner. While most varieties won't be available until September, new crop Gala and Honey Crisp will start in the second week of August. Until then, expect the apple market to remain mostly steady. Reds, Granny Smiths, and Fuji will stay in good supply throughout the summer. However, Fuji and Pink Lady prices will increase throughout August. Most shippers will finish their Golds in the next couple of weeks.

Asparagus

There is still good availability of Mexican asparagus from McAllen, TX; Los Angeles, CA; and Salinas, CA, with supply continuing to exceed demand. Currently, three main overlapping supply areas are harvesting in Mexico: Southern Baja, Northern Baja, and Central Mexico. Jumbo sizing remains very limited. Peruvian asparagus supplies are steady; while northern regions are starting to decrease slightly, new southern areas have already opened and will be ready for full harvest by early August.

Avocados

ALERT

Markets are rising as California and Peru begin to wind down. Flora Loca has started, but in very limited quantities, with maturity levels lower than those of the Normal crop still being shipped. Typically, Flora Loca floods the market, but this year that hasn't occurred due to the oil content needing to reach 24%. Shippers are taking precautions to prevent fruit from being mixed on the same pallet. California's season will continue through August, while Colombian shipments are arriving on the East Coast; volumes are expected to gradually decrease as the current crop comes to an end. Peru's supply will also continue through late August.

Bell Peppers

ALERT

Supplies remain extremely limited due to triple-digit temperatures in the San Joaquin Valley, which continue to impact production, quality, and harvesting. While there is slightly more supply emerging from the eastern areas—primarily #1 grade products—choice options remain scarce. Red bell peppers are particularly short from both California and Canada, with no relief anticipated in the near future. Some greenhouse partners have sourced imports from Holland to help meet demand, but it still falls short of what's needed.

Markets for 140ct and smaller sizes are expected to stay strong. With District 1 (San Joaquin Valley) finished, District 2 (Oxnard/Ventura County) has become the primary growing region, focusing on larger fruit. Additionally, offshore supplies on the West Coast are starting to provide some relief for domestic lemon shortages.

Valencias are available in the Central Valley and Riverside, with Brix levels around 12. Additionally, offshore Chilean fruit is available on the West Coast.

<u>Melon (Cantaloupe)</u>

Due to the recent heat wave, the crop is peaking on Jumbo 9s and 9s, with smaller fruit fetching a premium. Brix levels are ranging from 14 to 17. Retailers are gearing up to promote ADS at the end of July and into early August across all melons. However, there may be a gap in August as high yields begin to define the season. Additionally, the fall crop in Yuma is starting to come in.

The Wenatchee area, in particular, was significantly impacted by a frost during bloom, leading some shippers to doubt the viability of their crop in that district. Additionally, the Yakima and Hood River districts are also projected to be down by 20% compared to last year.

For Costa Rican pineapples, a lack of rainfall in the tropics has led to lower year-over-year crossings, but the new crop is expected to arrive in the U.S. in week 32. Meanwhile, Mexican pineapples are facing challenges due to heavy rains, which have caused internal issues and resulted in lower Brix levels that do not meet U.S. standards.

CALIFORNIA

A strengthening high pressure system combined with moderate marine layer conditions will result in near to slightly above average temperatures through the weekend. Morning lows will range from the mid 40s to low 60s, while daytime highs will reach the upper 50s to low 70s near the coast, upper 70s to upper 80s in the coastal valleys, and mid 90s to 103 degrees south of King City.



MEXICO

Isolated shower activity is expected over the fields of Central Mexico through August 4th, with rainfall totals generally ranging from 0.02 to 0.20 inches. However, higher amounts may occur during some thunderstorms. Temperatures are expected to remain near normal throughout the weekend, with highs in the mid 70s to mid 80s and lows ranging from the mid 50s to mid 60s across the forecast area.



FLORIDA

On Wednesday and Thursday, isolated to scattered showers may occur across the state, though moisture levels are somewhat limited due to midlevel ridging. As we approach the weekend, attention will turn to the tropics, where a currently disorganized system is developing. Temperatures in Florida will remain warm throughout the weekend, with highs ranging from the upper 80s to mid-90s most days and lows in the mid-70s to low 80s through Sunday morning. Winds are expected to gust between 15 and 22 mph across most of Southern Florida until August 2nd.



ARIZONA

Today, scattered showers and thunderstorms are possible in south-central Arizona as a plume of moisture flows in from the southeast. Otherwise, expect dry conditions and warmer-than-normal temperatures. Highs will reach the 104-110 range in most valleys today through Friday, increasing to 110-117 by Sunday afternoon. Morning lows will generally be in the 80s throughout this period. Light to moderate winds from the south, gusting up to 15-20 mph, will decrease as the weekend approaches.

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

The California fresh pear season has begun harvest in the Sacramento River Delta growing district with the Bartlett and Red Bartlett to start the season. Harvests from the Lake County and Mendocino growing regions of Northern California are set to begin in early to mid- August. The river growing district is the largest producer of California pears with approximately 66% followed by Lake County at 22% followed by Mendocino at 12%.

This year's California pear crop is excellent in quality, when it comes to fresh market pears, California farmers will pack over 2 million 36-pound boxes. In addition to 2 million-plus boxes of Bartlett pears, California pear growers will harvest another 500,000 boxes of other heirloom varieties including Golden Bosc, Sunsprite, Comice, Seckel and Red Pears along with a limited supply of organic varieties. Production is forecast to be down 25 - 30% overall as harvests begin.



Washington and Oregon production will follow the California crop by 2-3 weeks with harvests slated for mid-August. The Northwest Pear crop is facing numerous challenges this season. It has been a devastating Year for the Wenatchee Valley Growing Region. Due to extreme cold Temps in Feb. Anjous and Bartletts could be down as much as 60%. Yakima and Hood River OR growing areas are down roughly 20%. Bosc out of Wenatchee are basically wiped out 85% down from last Year. Yakima and Hood River are reporting at least 50% down. Red Pears are down 25% to 40% between all regions. Weneatchee Valley Grows the majority of Washington Pears so this will be a very unusual Season for over-all availability.
